







































<i>Cercis canadensis</i> <b>Eastern Redbud</b>  The profuse flowers that bloom in April or May before the leaves develop make this a spring favorite. It is attractive as a tree for naturalized garden areas or as a graceful addition to a small yard.				25'	30'	5	Multi-stem or low branching tree. <i>Cercis canadensis</i> 'Appalachian Red' <b>Appalachian Red Redbud</b>  This cultivar has the brightest flowers we have seen in a Eastern Redbud. Magenta buds open to shockingly bright pink blooms, often described as neon pink or hot pink, quite different from the lavender tinted soft pink more typically seen in the species. <i>Cercis canadensis</i> 'NC216-2' PP 31260 <b>Flame Thrower® Redbud</b>  Bright pink flowers of spring are upstaged by heart-shaped leaves that deliver a season-long, kaleidoscopic array of bright colors that change from shades of deep burgundy to red to burnt orange, bright yellow, green and gold. <i>Cercis canadensis</i> 'Morton' <b>Joy's Pride™ Redbud</b> Bright blooms bring joy to Morton Arboretum visitors, where Joy's Pride™ was discovered and named for the arboretum's founder, Joy Sterling Morton. <i>Cercis canadensis</i> 'Covey' <b>Lavender Twist® Redbud</b> Elegant and graceful, weeping and compact, this plant creates a great feature in a small garden. <i>Cercis canadensis</i> 'Merlot' PP22297 <b>Merlot Redbud</b> Compact form and glossier, more heat resistant leaves than those of Forest Pansy suggest better performance in warm climates. <i>Cercis canadensis</i> 'Pink Trim' <b>Northern Herald® Redbud</b> This extremely cold hardy selection discovered in central South Dakota brings bright pink blooms to prairie and mountain landscapes. <i>Cercis texensis</i> 'Oklahoma' <b>Oklahoma Redbud</b> Heat resistant foliage is deep green, bright and glossy. <i>Cercis canadensis</i> 'Pink Heartbreaker' PP23043 <b>Pink Heartbreaker Redbud</b> Lavender pink flower clusters cling tightly to the weeping branches of this vigorous, heat and drought tolerant cultivar. <i>Cercis canadensis</i> 'Pink Pom Poms' PP27630 <b>Pink Pom Poms Redbud</b> Uniquely double-petaled flowers are borne in dense, pendulous clusters along bare branches in early spring. This hybrid of double-flowered <i>C. canadensis</i> 'Flame' and <i>C. texensis</i> 'Oklahoma' was developed at North Carolina State University by Dr. Dennis Werner.			20'	15'	6b	Rounded	Glossy green	Yellow	Reddish purple, double
<i>Cercis canadensis</i> 'Ruby Falls' PP22097 <b>Ruby Falls Redbud</b> Pendulous branches laden with clusters of rose purple blooms tumble from the trunk of this petite weeping tree in early spring. Glossy, deep purple, heart-shaped leaves soon follow. This NCSU creation blends the best features of its popular parents, Lavender Twist® and Forest Pansy.			8'	6'	5	Weeping	Deep purple, glossy	Yellow-bronze	Rose purple
<i>Cercis canadensis</i> 'Vanilla Twist' PP22744 <b>Vanilla Twist Redbud</b> Pure white, pea-like flowers smother the twisting, cascading branches of this hybrid of Lavender Twist® and Royal White Redbuds in springtime. Foliage soon follows, emerging chartreuse and maturing to light green, heart shaped leaves that turn yellow in autumn.
